# A WORD FROM THE EDITOR

SOS SAHEL International France has been working with the population in the Sahel for more than 40 years. In the beginning, our mission was to tackle food insecurity and famine caused by frequent and severe droughts. Since then, we have traveled a long and fruitful road, forming cooperatives and groups made up of thousands of individuals across the Sahel - most notably women - to take over the restoration of their land, set up effective agricultural practices, lay the foundation for WASH projects, and find the means to send their children to school.

The year 2019 bore witness to tragic instances of terrorism including the deadly attacks that hit Burkina Faso on Christmas Eve. We were deeply saddened by these murders which left the villages of Northern Burkina Faso in terror.

This led to a revelation: we must fight on two fronts: security and development.

In 2019, SOS SAHEL introduced the “Green Initiative” to multiply our efforts throughout the Sahel region, strengthen economic and social development, and restore the environment, particularly degraded agricultural lands.

This flagship program is a solution to meet the United Nations’ Sustainable Development Goals to achieve a resilient, nurturing Sahel that will bring stability and security to it’s people.

Thanks to our partners, donors and local teams, we are able to rise to these challenges day after day. Despite the recurrent crises hitting the region – including the latest global health crisis due to Covid-19, we are determined to fulfill our mission and make the Sahel a fertile and prosperous land for all.

# OUR ACTIVITIES



## Equip

In order to overcome food insecurity, the Sahelian people must be equipped with skills and tools for production. SOS SAHEL is mobilizing local actors to increase farmer access to natural resources, tools and equipment, finance mechanisms and infrastructure to promote local products. SOS SAHEL is also committed to increasing the availability of basic social services (water, hygiene, sanitation, etc.), which are essential to the sustainable development of the region and its population.



## Secure

The Sahel is dealing with issues of climate change and sustained population growth, which causes land degradation and a constant exodus in a broader context of insecurity. In light of these ever-growing challenges, SOS SAHEL is making it easier for farmers to access agricultural knowledge and modern techniques. In doing so, these farmers can increase production, secure sufficient income, and achieve sustainable independence while preserving the environment. SOS SAHEL believes that peace and security in the region can be obtained by investing in sustainable initiatives and local stakeholders.



## Train and Enhance Expertise

The Sahelian people are the driving force of ancestral knowledge and know-how. The very heart of SOS SAHEL's mission lies in spreading the spirit of entrepreneurship and encouraging the emergence of innovative ideas and leaders. To do so, we promote local skills and work in conjunction with family and local organizations to ensure that they are trained and structured in an effective way. SOS SAHEL assists in the process of enhancing expertise through grassroots organization, anticipating issues, project management, project assistance and strengthening of economic sectors.



## Innovate and Publicize

Across the Sahelian belt, from Senegal to Djibouti, the Sahelian people are confronted with the same crises and climate challenges working hard to adapt, overcome and prevent these issues in the future. SOS SAHEL has created tools to facilitate exchange of experience; backing local innovation and the transfer of knowledge across all countries in the Sahel.





## Equip

The Borena area in the south of **Ethiopia** is regularly affected by several droughts that lead to poor pasture conditions, water sources drying up, falls in production and an explosion in the price of food. In light of the crisis caused by the El Niño phenomenon in 2017, SOS SAHEL backed the introduction of a mechanism that would combine:

- Emergency interventions (distribution of powdered formula, screening of malnourished children, etc.);
- Actions to sustainably improve the food security of the most affected farming communities (awareness of best practices, rehabilitation of production infrastructure and access to water, seeds and supplies suited to the local climate, etc.).



## Secure

SOS SAHEL is able to manage large-scale actions in fragile settings. Since 2014, it has been working in the north of **Mali** alongside the government to restore the foundations of the economy and strengthen local dialog. SOS SAHEL backed the introduction of local development plans, defining priorities for municipalities with local authorities, local associations and communities. More than 500 local agriculture, livestock rearing or reforestation initiatives have been included and financed within these plans to benefit over 1.2 million people.



## Train and Enhance Expertise

**Chad** is the world's second largest producer of gum arabic after Sudan. It is against this backdrop that SOS SAHEL has been working with gum arabic farmers to enhance their expertise and boost production. A lot of effort has gone into organizing farmers into groups and to provide technical and organizational training. These actions have fostered the development of an entrepreneurial spirit and one of support for one another. After more than ten years of work, the farmers have built a profession which generates income. They have cultivated their knowledge and obtained a better understanding of techniques; all of which guarantees the preservation of Acacia forests. Women have become more independent and now participate in business decisions.



## Innovate and Publicize

In October 2019, SOS SAHEL launched **SPARK2050**, an initiative which will identify ten innovative farming technologies to be deployed over 30 years, thus transforming the lives of 300 million Sahelians. Digital literacy and connectivity will support modern, innovative and intelligent agricultural models necessary for the Sahel to grow. For SOS SAHEL, technology must be integrated within production to ensure blossoming African value chains. This will foster exchange of knowledge, reinforce farmer autonomy and result in significant, durable yields for all.

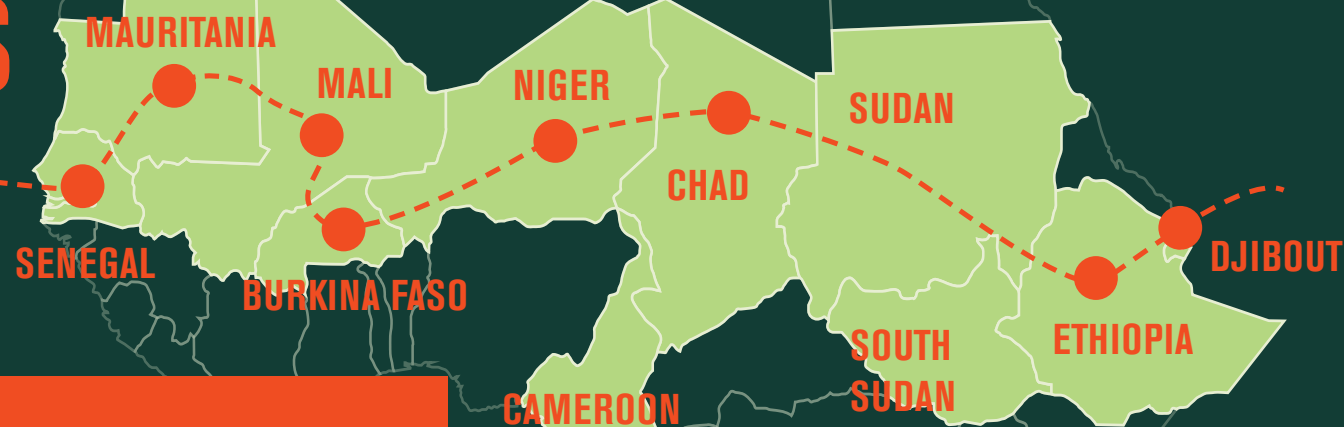

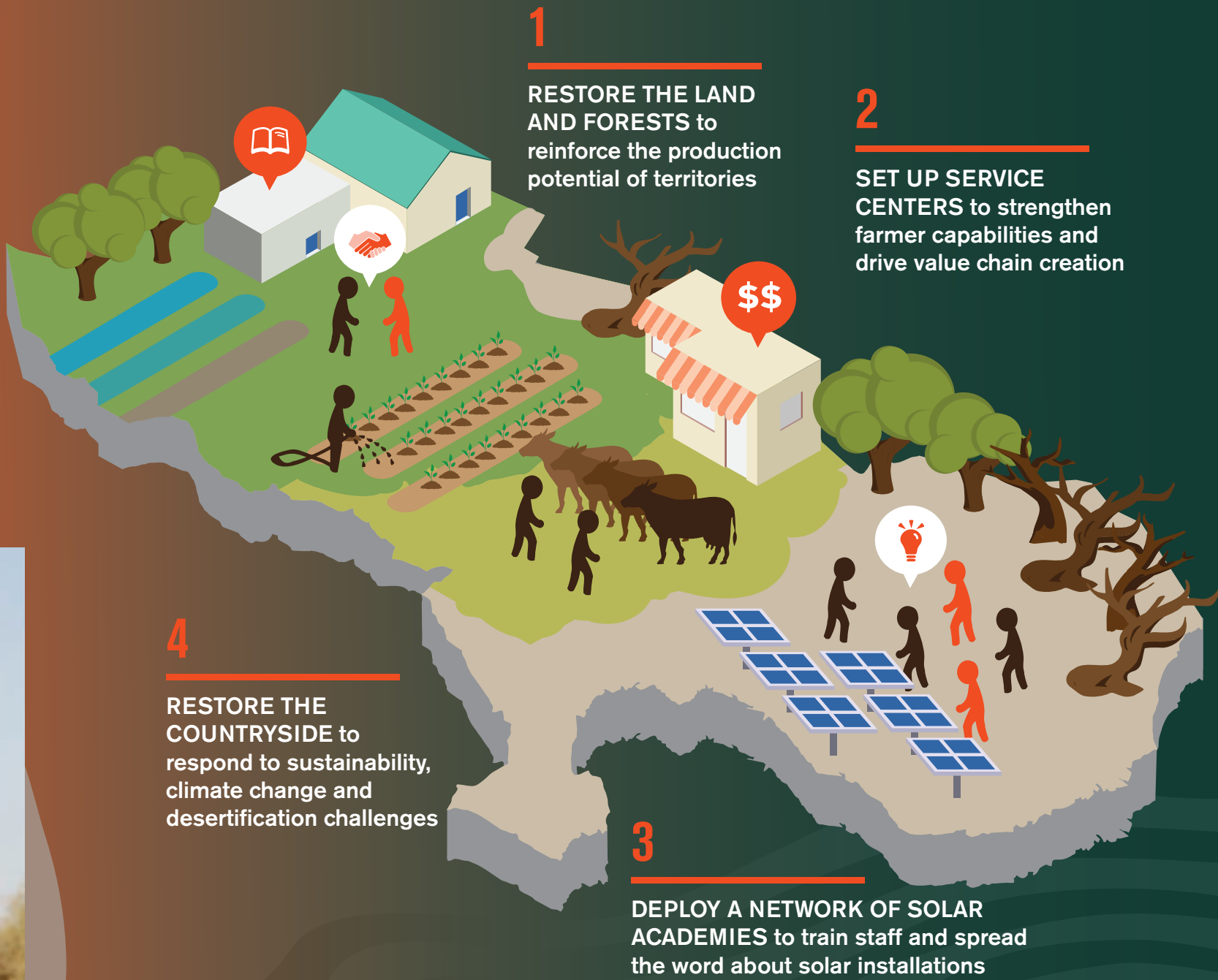




# ACCELERATING CHANGE

## THE GREEN INITIATIVE WAS LAUNCHED IN BURKINA FASO IN JANUARY 2019 WITH THE “BEOG PUUTO” (FIELDS OF THE FUTURE) OPERATION

“Beog Puuto” is a solution to food and nutrition insecurity as well as to the continual degradation of land in Burkina Faso. SOS SAHEL, the Great Green Wall, partner NGOs and government services are leading this action which will help restore 30,000 hectares of land by promoting land use planning, layout and restoration techniques. In total, 50,000 families will receive support to sustainably increase their agro-silvopastoral production.

We became aware of SOS SAHEL in the 1990s, and sought its help because we had heard about all the good it was doing in the field and because the women from Sanankoroba were experiencing a lot of problems at that time.

We first asked SOS SAHEL to finance a market garden, provide cows, and then a women's health center to improve the living conditions of the people.

From 1990 to now, there has been a very positive change in mentality in Sanankoroba. Children go to school – even girls. Women are responsible for everything they do and can participate in round table meetings with men to meet up and decide their future. ”

FINANCES

SOS SAHEL International France has a variety of sources of funds thanks to the trust placed by its donors and various financial partners. These resources make it possible to ensure the organization’s financial security, and to benefit from a collaboration with stakeholders with a range of experiences.

**10.7 %** of funds came from the generosity of the public:

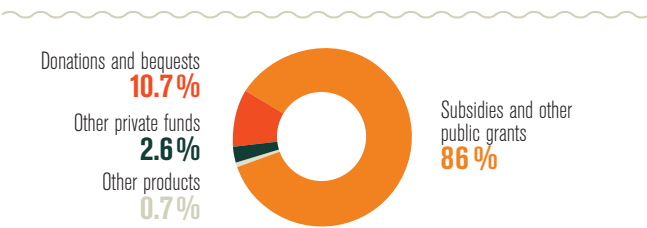
This accounted for a total of EUR 1,489,000 throughout the year (public donations: EUR 1,388,330; bequests: EUR 100,808). Increased fundraising efforts ensured continued public generosity. 19% of the funds raised from public generosity went to fundraising.

**2.6 %** of funds came from sponsorship and other private subsidies:

The actions carried out in 2019 in the Sahel benefited from the support of a range of companies, associations and foundations for a total of EUR 361,000.

**86 %** of funds came from public subsidies:

Public subsidies represented a total of EUR 11,994,000. They helped support long-term operations consistent with national priorities in the Sahelian countries (e.g.: Ministry of Finance, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, AFD, European Union, Swedish International Development Agency).

The steady growth in development actions in the Sahel continued with the launch of several new operations for the most vulnerable populations across the Sahelian belt.

**88.3 %** of assets were dedicated to social functions:

**ACTIONS IN THE SAHEL**  
These actions represented 86.5% of the assets in 2019. This consisted in the expenses incurred in relation to the execution of projects led by SOS SAHEL International France in close cooperation with the Sahelian associations in the SOS SAHEL network and the other local SOS SAHEL partners.

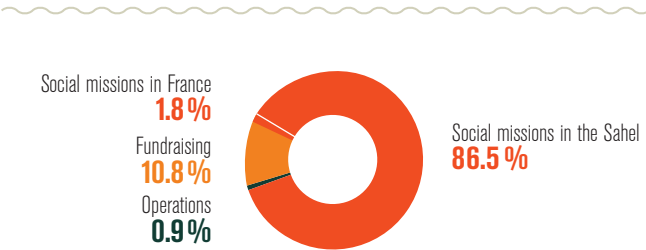
**ACTIONS IN FRANCE**  
These actions represented 1.8 % of the assets in 2019. These expenses, accounting for EUR 171,000 in 2019, were used to carry out public awareness and information campaigns.

**10.8 %** of assets were allocated to fundraising:

This expense, which stood at EUR 1,035,000, helped the association develop its financial resources to support the development of its actions in the Sahel. Due to the steady downward trend in private funding over the previous years, since 2015, it has been necessary to make efforts to maintain the association's financial resources

**0.9 %** of assets were dedicated to operations:

The association's fixed costs represented EUR 87,000 in 2019. (This included purchases, external services, social and tax expenses and other unallocated administration expenses).

“

I am 43 years old, and I live in Gallamo with my husband, a livestock farmer, and my three children aged five and eight. We live right at the top of the village. Before the large reservoir was built with the support of SOS SAHEL, every day I would walk two kilometers [over a mile] to get water. Sometimes I wasn't able to find water and we had nothing to drink for days.

Now we have access to drinking water on a regular basis. There are also stand-pipes that make life easier for us. In the village, the burden for women who are responsible for supplying water to households has been eased, which allows them to spend more time doing other things. ”

In Niger, potatoes are now the country's second largest production. To control the sale of merchandise, we set up local points of sale in the capital. We also taught farmers to hold back their produce to stagger sales, which represents real added value and substantial gain. We trained up the farmers through farmer field schools who, in turn, trained their teams and friends and families. The SOS SAHEL approach is based on getting people to do the work themselves.
